Land acknowledgment

Leadership message

I am so pleased to share the 2023 Youth Amplified impact report with you. This year we're celebrating another year of successes, through significant growth and lasting impact on our communities.

Since 2020, we have worked in partnership with youth-serving organizations across Halton and Peel regions to forge pathways to postsecondary education for equity-deserving groups (first-generation students, racialized and Indigenous youth, newcomers, persons with dependents or persons from lowincome households). Sheridan's Youth Amplified strategy and programming continue to break down barriers and unlock the transformative power of education.

These programs offer youth mentorship, connections to financial aid and other resources, and groundbreaking hands-on learning experiences within STEM (science, technology, engineering and math) and the arts. We also offer guidance through the postsecondary application process, a window into student life, and engagement with our exceptional students, faculty and staff.

I am proud that these collaborative programs give youth exposure to a variety of educational and career options, all while increasing their confidence and motivation to pursue postsecondary education.

Our Youth Amplified strategy also impacts learners. For Sheridan students, this program provides excellent paid work and volunteer opportunities. Our participants receive real-life skills in leadership, communication and cross-cultural awareness.

And lastly, this program is a wonderful example of partnership. With the help of our collaborators, we're fostering youth development and engagement. As we look to the future, Sheridan will strengthen existing partnerships and explore new ones, as we continue to innovate and co-create initiatives with the communities we're proud to serve.

Program highlights

Bigs on Campus and the Black Youth Mentorship Program (BYMP)

Big Brothers Big Sisters of Peel-York and Halton and Hamilton

These programs pair Sheridan student mentors with youth mentees (ages 9-14 years) from the community for weekly group activities throughout the school year at our Sheridan campuses. The youth mentees are clients of the Big Brothers Big Sisters organizations many have had multiple adverse childhood experiences and therefore mentorship from a positive role model is a critical positive influence on their life trajectory.

The purpose of the programs is to build confidence and interpersonal skills for the mentees, fuelling their potential and broadening their horizons for attending postsecondary education in the future.

The Black Youth Mentorship Program (BYMP) connects self-identified Black youth with Black Sheridan students to empower and inspire them to create their own unique narratives and pathways to success. The focused curriculum infuses interactive and thought-provoking activities through the exploration of STEAM activities and a wide variety of educational pathways.


Impact

- 100% of BYMP participants feel they know more about university or college life and know more about Black culture and history because of the program.
- 100% of Bigs on Campus program mentees reported that their relationship with their mentor was positive or very positive.



The workshops that Sheridan provides give a chance for our youth to see what certain academic pursuits can help them do. Even something as simple as the campus tours has been impactful in helping to start conversations about what the future possibilities can be for our youth. And the BYMP allows for Black youth to connect with Black mentors and hear about what they're doing in school as well.

Home Suite Hope (HSH) partnership

Home Suite Hope has been a long-standing partner of Sheridan since 2015.

The organization provides a network of vital wraparound supports to single-parent families who are experiencing homelessness or precarious housing in Halton Region. Once their housing situation is stabilized, Sheridan supports the parent's journey by providing a bursary for them to complete a postsecondary diploma at the College. With additional resources — including mentorship from Sheridan staff — HSH and Sheridan give these single parents the education and skills needed to secure a job and establish self-sustainability — breaking the cycle of poverty for the next generation of their families.

Impact

- There were 18 mentor-mentee matches between Sheridan staff and Home Suite Hope clients attending Sheridan in 2023.
- 14 HSH clients were enrolled in a diploma program; three of which graduated and received a diploma.
- Four HSH clients were enrolled in and completed the Academic Upgrading program, and then moved on to enrol in a diploma program.



Mentorship through female executives, professors and staff at Sheridan has been a game changer for our participants at HSH. Navigating postsecondary school, often as the first person in your family, with no external supports is hard and anxiety-provoking. Prior to the mentorship program, our participants tended to get stuck and allow anxiety to prevent them from completing specific tasks. Having someone inside the institution who both has lived experience in postsecondary school and who works within this institution has allowed for much smoother transitions for our single parents. In addition, these relationships have translated to HSH staff understanding the systems and processes of the institution better.

Supporting youth in extended society care

Sheridan is proud to collaborate with our local Children's Aid Societies in Halton and Peel, as well as contributing to the broader Peel-Dufferin-Halton Ontario Education Championship Team (OECT) to facilitate access to postsecondary education for youth who have been in the child welfare system.

Statistics show that youth who have been in the child welfare system are less likely to attend postsecondary education compared to their peers. Therefore, Sheridan collaborates with key partners — particularly the local school boards and Children's Aid Societies — to break down barriers and facilitate access to postsecondary education for these youth.

In 2023, Sheridan had four students apply for and receive our bursary for youth who are exiting or have ever been in extended society care. To date, Sheridan has issued over \$9,000 through this bursary, helping to ensure these students can complete a postsecondary degree or diploma tuition-free.

Up to 20 eligible students annually can apply for Sheridan's Bursary for Youth in Extended Society Care.

STEAM youth outreach and engagement

In 2023, Sheridan significantly boosted its youth outreach and engagement activities related to building interest and exposing youth to science, technology, engineering, arts and math (STEAM) programs and future careers.

A suite of on-campus and in-community workshops, camps and special events were delivered in collaboration with community partners to give children and youth ranging from kindergarten to Grade 12 opportunities to experience hands-on learning in a fun and engaging manner, with Sheridan students often delivering the content and engagement activities.



Engage, Empower, Connect (E2C) Cyber Smart Program

During 2023, Sheridan was one of several Actua network members across Canada to fully implement their E2C Cyber Smart program, empowering over 123 youth in Peel and Halton regions to explore, create and connect responsibly in the digital world. The program was delivered through after-school programs at the YMCA of Oakville and BGC Peel locations.

The E2C programs run weekly for 4-6 weeks and empower youth to be responsible digital citizens with the ability to create positive and inclusive spaces online, while also touching upon the risks involved in online interactions and how they can be avoided. The curriculum also introduces youth to fulfilling careers in coding and cybersecurity.

Go Where Kids Are STEAM workshops and events

In 2023, Sheridan's Student STEAM Outreach Instructors engaged 1,153 youth in free, hands-on STEAM workshops at community partner locations across Peel and Halton regions.

These workshops provided free and fun handson learning aligned to STEAM topics such as chemical reactions, solar energy, coding, states of matter, design thinking, structural and mechanical engineering concepts and more.

Women in Tech and Trades events

In the fall of 2023 and in partnership with Skills Ontario, Sheridan hosted 120 young women in grades 7 and 8 from several Peel-district schools to take part in Skilled Trade and Tech Days for Young Women. Through handson workshops, event participants explored a variety of skilled trades and technology careers and networked with women in the skilled trades.



Revving Up! The Future of the Automotive Industry Day

With generous support through the Ontario Vehicle Innovation Network (OVIN), Sheridan hosted 40 students in grades 11 and 12 from Turner Fenton Secondary School in Brampton to participate in a specially curated day of hands-on experiences about educational and career pathways in the exciting mobility and automotive industry. Sheridan's expert mechanical engineering faculty guided the students on engineering and mechatronics as it relates to building electric vehicles, as well as environmental sustainability implications. Students got to tour several labs and complete a hands-on activity with modulation used in electric vehicles.

Impact

 As a result of what they learned, 73% of the event participants expressed being much more interested in attending university or college.

March break and summer camps

During March break and the summer of 2023, Sheridan's School of Computing within the Faculty of Applied Science and Technology hosted week-long camps for youth aged 11–14 years out of our Brampton campus.

A total of 67 youth engaged in computing- and coding-focused camps and were exposed to a wide variety of topics and activities, including the MIT App Inventor with Sheridan Professor Harsh Thakkar — Canada's first expert trainer for the MIT App Inventor.

Impact

- 93% of campers rated the camps overall from good to amazing.
- 60% of campers expressed being more interested in attending university or college.

Camp ArtHouse Halton

ArtHouse Halton is a long-standing partner of Sheridan, having collaborated with us since 2010.

ArtHouse provides free, arts-based programs for children and youth aged 7–17 years across Halton Region who cannot access paid programming. They operate with the intention of enhancing creativity, resilience, self-discovery, confidence and artistic skills in the children and youth.

In the summer of 2023, Sheridan once again hosted Camp ArtHouse in person at our Trafalgar Road Campus in Oakville, which saw 62 youth engage in two week-long camps where they collaborated to produce live performances. The youth spent the week learning and experiencing all aspects of musical theatre from auditions to casting, rehearsing the script, choreography, music, backstage setup and of course, performing!



Finances are tight for our family and having three children makes it really difficult to have the kids participate in any extracurricular activities, as the money just isn't there for us. Without ArtHouse, my children would not have had the opportunity to attend camps this summer, and seeing their happiness when I told them they were able to attend thanks to the generous people who have donated to ArtHouse — it was incredibly emotional for me.

Youth in Policing Initiative (YIPI)

Peel Regional Police (PRP)

Since 2009, Peel Regional Police (PRP) has delivered the Youth in Policing Initiative (YIPI) program, which provides summer employment to youth between the ages of 15–18 years from priority populations across Peel region. The goal is to provide leadership, life and job skills for these youth through a mentorship and teamwork approach.

For the second year in a row, PRP collaborated with Sheridan's School of Public Safety to enhance the experience for these youth by providing them with:

- An on-campus experience at Sheridan's Brampton campus.
- Participation in the Dual Credit program to get credit for one college-level course.
- An introduction to the field of forensics from Public Safety faculty.
- Participation in empathy-based training using virtual reality technology.
- Participation in police fitness testing protocols.

Due to the successful 2022 partnership, the number of students sponsored by the Ontario Ministry of Children, Community and Social Services was increased from 25 students to 40 students for 2023.



The YIPI program is a unique opportunity for youth mentorship, growth and the development of professional and life skills. Peel Regional Police is proud of the impact that the program has had in our community. We find many of the youth later return to our service as either officers or civilian professionals. We are grateful to Sheridan College and the Ministry of Children, Community and Social Services for their ongoing support, partnership and commitment to ensuring the program remains a success.
